Tywyn Town Council Biodiversity & Report 2024-25

Section 6 of the Environment Act (Wales) 2016, sets out the Biodiversity and Resilience of Ecosystems Duty under which, all local authorities must seek to maintain and enhance biodiversity in the exercise of its functions, and in so doing promote the resilience of ecosystems.

For Tywyn Town Council, this means that in all internal policies, activities and management of open spaces, the Council should seek opportunities to maintain and enhance the wildlife that is supported in the area and to manage the habitats so that they are in as natural and resilient a condition as possible.

The duty also supports Tywyn Town Council's wider responsibilities under the Well-being of Future Generations (Wales) Act 2015 in order that Wales benefits from a prosperous economy, a health and resilient environment and vibrant, cohesive communities.

The Council has a positive record of contributing to the local environment and promoting sustainability. The following action plan provides the detail of the proposed activities that the Town Council will undertake in the period 2019-25 to support biodiversity and the Tywyn ecosystems.

Introduction and Context

As of January 2025, the recorded resident population of Tywyn is 3,264 although this increases significantly during the summer season due to the many holiday homes and caravan sites in the area. The precept for 2024-25 was £101,894.13, which is managed by the Council in order to provide a range of services for the community which will have an impact on local diversity. Tywyn Town Council is directly responsible for:

The Cambrian Road Recreation Ground
Bryn Paderau Memorial Park
Brook Street Garden.
The upkeep of some of the footpaths and bus shelters in Tywyn.
Organising planters throughout Tywyn and the planting in front of the office.

Tywyn Town Council is the owner of the Ynysymaengwyn Estate but the responsibility for the management of the grounds and caravan park is with the Ynysymaengwyn Trust Committee, Miss Mary Corbetts Gift to Ynysymaengwyn, Charity number 1118400. Tywyn Town Council is one of the Trustees.

Ynysymaengwyn has successfully received the Green Flag Award every year since 2010.

Support – Tywyn Town Council give grants and support to local groups who want to positively impact biodiversity.

Tywyn Town Council promote sustainability and biodiversity by pursuing sustainability practices whenever possible.

Review of Section 6 duty

What has worked well?

The Allotments have prospered since the formation of the Cambrian Road Allotment Association with a proactive committee overseeing management in conjunction with the Council. Disused plots have been brought back into cultivation, new fencing has been erected and there is now a waiting list for vacant plots.

Residents have been encouraged to volunteer to look after areas in Tywyn such as the planters, filling bird feeders and helping out with gardening and watering where appropriate.

Working with SNPA and Gwynedd Council is ongoing and working well, with representatives keen to work together.

Groups of volunteers coming together to create and improve biodiversity, who have been encouraging other people to becoming involved and volunteer.

We have adopted a process of aiming to ensure that work is given to local contractors, thus reducing our carbon footprint.

What have the barriers been?

Limited expertise to identify changes needed / possible or best practice.

What will you change?

Aim to work more closely with SNPA, Gwynedd Council and local experts to seek advice.

How and when will the Section 6 duty be monitored and the Section 6 plan reviewed?

The duty will be monitored by the Council and individual officers will report back through the usual monthly and annual inspections.

The Section 6 plan will be reviewed in light of these reports and any other information that is made available to the council from volunteers etc. At the time of this report's publication, there is no specific time or date set for the plan to be reviewed, but it is expected this will be able to be completed within the next 12 months.
